Dear Students, Parents, and Carers,

As you will be very aware, we are rapidly approaching the summer examination series.

This booklet has been produced to provide helpful information about the format of all examinations, as well as details about what students will be focusing on in lessons in the last few months, and advice on how they can best prepare, and take advantage of further support in place.

There are a variety of revision opportunities for students to take advantage of, for example, and most subjects also have an array of revision resources on the Google Classrooms. There is, additionally, a wealth of support available online. Revision resources and past papers can be found, as well as guides on how to revise, and produce a revision timetable, and how to keep any exam anxiety under control.

Please encourage your child to speak to their form tutor, Year Team Leader, subject teacher, or Head of Department should they have any further questions or concerns about their upcoming examinations. Mr Leahy (Examinations Officer), the SEN Department, and Pastoral Support are also there to offer guidance and support to students.

We are here to help and support, and will always do our best to address any anxieties at a time that we recognise will be challenging for many of our students.

We recommend that students start their revision now, if they have not already done so, starting with a few hours every week (the Core Subject Revision Evening will outline the best ways to prepare for those examinations). By mid-March, study time should be 'turned up a notch' with revision for an hour or two every couple of days. Students should ensure that they have an effective revision timetable, working backwards from their exam date to ensure that they cover (and practise) all of the relevant topics. The more that students can put in for the next few months can genuinely contribute to movement up though the grade boundaries and building confidence and stamina for their exams.

Accessing exam information on Compass

As you can see in the Key Dates section above, a Statement of Entry for your child's exams will be available to view on Compass from early March, while their final timetable should be visible around the end of April, about 1-2 weeks before the summer exams begin.

Once released, these documents can be accessed in the Compass web browser under the Exams tab. If using the Compass app on a phone, the browser can be accessed at the bottom of the More/Apps menu, under 'Open in Browser.'

Results in 2025: What you need to know

As usual, members of the College staff will be present to share in the results and to offer advice.

Year 11 applicants to the College Sixth Form will be asked to confirm their enrolment by completing a short e-enrolment form.

Results should be collected by the student themselves. Any results not collected by <u>12</u> midday that day will be posted to the student's home address that afternoon.

If your child is unable to attend that morning, but would like someone to collect results on their behalf, please write a short letter or email to the College (to be received in advance of results day) authorising a named person to collect them. This person would normally be a close relative, and they may be requested to show proof of their identity before being given the results.

The College is unable to give your results to any unauthorised people, and is unable to give results by email or over the phone unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Such an arrangement needs to be agreed in advance.

GCSE Business (Edexcel)

An outline of the examination/s:

Two exam papers, both 105 minutes. Paper 1 covers Theme 1, Paper 2 covers Theme 2.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

As we finish the final topics of the syllabus, in class students will be doing guided revision, work on exam practice and exam technique.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Students should be actively revising, focusing mainly on the topics across the syllabus, using class notes, revision guides and workbooks (we still have some available for purchase in school), along with recommended websites and youtube channels. Students would be wise to practise past papers and exam style questions to hone their skills.

Additional support available:

We have sufficient class time to provide suitable revision and exam practice. Should students require support on specific topics they should seek further guidance from their teacher. Both Ms Foster and Mr Davie are available on a Tuesday evening to support revision.

GCSE Computer Science (OCR)

An outline of the examination/s:

2 exam papers, each consisting of 50% of the final grade

Paper 1: Computer systems

Paper 2: Programming and programming theory

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Students will revisit topic areas that students generally struggle with. Documentation with regards to this will be shared with students on Google Classroom. Students will also be using a tracker which will identify to them and their teacher which topics they feel weakest on.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

- Purchase a study/revision guide. Links for these are on Google Classroom.
- Make use of the revision videos by Craig & Dave. Link on Google Classroom (Youtube).
- Use BBC Bitesize/Seneca Learning for detailed and summarized revision notes and key terms.

Additional support available:

Your child should contact their classroom teacher if they have any questions or concerns about a specific topic.

GCSE Design and Technology (EDUQAS)

An outline of the examination/s:

50% Coursework from sketchbook design folder and making (due in 30/03)

50% written exam

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

We will continue with the coursework up until Easter and then start to revise for the theory exam after Easter break. If you are behind in your coursework you need to ensure this is caught up over the next 5 weeks. There are after school catch ups and as you know, your DT homework all year has been to ensure you are prepared to meet your coursework deadlines.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

For the written exam they should be preparing by revising from revision guides. There is a specific Eduqas guide but it is expensive. Any GCSE 9-1 Design Technology revision guide will be fine as the exam boards follow the same spec from JCQ. The exam board website has digital revision resources and past papers and mark schemes that can be downloaded. GCSE bitesize and www.technologystudent.com are also very good resources.

Additional support available:

After school catch up sessions on Thursdays will turn into additional revision sessions after Easter. Seek guidance from your teachers if you are unsure what to do or to check if you are doing the right amount of revision.

GCSE Drama (AQA)

An outline of the examination/s:

Section A: Four multiple choice questions on theatre roles and terminology (4 marks)

Section B: Four stepped questions on an extract taken from the play *Around the World in Eighty Days* by Jules Verne/Laura Eason (Nick Hern Modern Plays, ISBN 978-1848425170) . (44 marks)

Section C: One choice of essay question reviewing a piece of live or recorded theatre, watched as part of the course. National Theatre Jane Eyre. (32 marks)

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Students will be completing their Scripted performances which will be marked by an external examiner shortly after the half term break. Their Devised performance and the accompanying Devising log will be sent off in April to be moderated by the exam board. All of the remaining lessons will be focusing on preparing for the final written exam.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

- Revise Section A knowledge using Google Classroom resources, BBC Bitesize etc.
- Read and re-read the set play, making practical revision notes and sketches in preparation for the

Section B questions.

• Watch (and re-watch, if recorded) live theatre and make practical revision notes in preparation for the Section C live theatre review.

An outline of the examination/s:

This year your grade will be based on the work you have produced over the course and will include your sketchbook work and final pieces. From January onwards you will be working on your Exam project to support your Art exam . Your practical exam will take place in March.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Complete all project/sketchbook/final piece work to the highest standard possible prior to submission of your work for grading.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

As above, Complete all project/sketchbook/exam prep work to the highest standard possible prior to submission of your work for grading. This can be done at home as well as in school and there are grading booklets available to help you understand/simplify the marking criteria and help you know what to do to improve your work.

Additional support available:

Speak to your teacher if you require any extra help or assistance and they will help or point you in the direction of someone who can help.

GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition (AQA)

An outline of the examination/s:

50% coursework with practical food exam

50% written exam

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

We will continue to work on coursework in lessons up until Easter and the final date for submission of completed work will be 25/04/2022. We will then switch to revision and written exam prep in the weeks prior to the Exam in June.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

They must complete any outstanding coursework before their practical exam and complete the evaluation and submit by 25/04. They should purchase aga food preparation and nutrition revision guide and revise for the written exam on the 20th June. They should be completing exam prep revision each week using a revision guide, gcse bitesize or other revision apps/techniques

Additional support available:

Students can speak to their teachers regarding any additional support or guidance they need. There will be some after school catch up sessions to help students with anything they need to work on.

GCSE French (AQA)

An outline of the examination/s:

Listening exam - 25% of the overall GCSE grade

Reading exam - 25% of the overall GCSE grade

Writing exam - 25% of the overall GCSE grade

Speaking exam - 25% of the overall GCSE grade. This exam is conducted by the teacher and marked by an examiner.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Students are currently reaching the end of the course. We will now focus on exam technique and exam timing. This period of time will include knowledge recall but students must be revising content at home.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

- Preparing general conversation questions for the speaking exam.
- Practising with exemplar roleplay cards and photo cards for the speaking exam.
- Revising vocabulary
- Practising past papers and exemplar questions for the listening, reading and writing exams.

An outline of the examination/s:

Paper 1: Global Geographical Issues (Topics 1-3) - 94 marks

Paper 2: UK Geographical Issues (Topics 4-6) - 94 marks

Paper 3: People & Environment Issues: Making Geographical Decisions (Topics 7-9)- 64 marks

All papers are 1 hour and 30 minutes

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

- Students will complete a Paper 2 mock in January and a Paper 3 mock during the March mock week. They completed a Paper 1 mock in November.
- Students will finish the course by Easter and after this time we will be focussing on exam technique and exam timing. This period of time will include knowledge recall but

students must be revising content at home.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Students should be familiarising themselves with the structure of each exam and revising content at home using the revision flashcards they have been provided with and resources on Google Classroom.

Paper 1AB - Germany, Democracy and Dictatorship, 1890 - 1945

Paper 1 BD - Conflict and Tension in Asia, 1945 - 1975

Paper 2AA - Health and the People, c1000 - Present Day

Paper 2BC - Elizabethan England, c1568 - 1603

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Students have completed a Paper 1 (Germany & Conflict) in their November mock and their mock in March will be on Paper 2 (Health & Elizabeth) ensuring they have had a practice of all exam papers before the examinations.

Once we have completed the content - We will use our remaining lessons for revision, of all four topics. Considering subject knowledge as well as revising the expectations and practise of skills needed to apply knowledge to the examination.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Revision of topics- reviewing the specifications, focussing on areas of weakness.

Students have their exercise books - one for each topic

Speak to your History teacher if there are any aspects of your History GCSE you do not feel confident about.





GCSE Latin (WJEC/EDUQAS)

An outline of the examination/s:

Three Papers:

- 1. Language (1hr 30mins)
- 2. Literature (1hr 15mins)
- 3. Roman Civilisation (1 hr)

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Continue to cover the content in class as well as giving guidance on revision techniques. They will be literature mock and a Roman Civilisation mock in class. Students are set past language examination papers for homework and in class.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

An outline of the examination/s:

Paper 1 Friday 15th May (non-calculator) 1 hour 30 minutes

Paper 2 Wednesday 4th June (calculator) 1 hour 30 minutes

Paper 3 Wednesday 11th June (calculator) 1 hour 30 minutes

Examination Board Modifications:

An examination aid is provided with extra formulae.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Reviewing key topics in lessons using analysis from mock examinations.

Targeted intervention sessions during form time.

Students will receive a personal revision list to aid with their independent revision.

Continue to upload resources to the GCSE Mathematics 2025 Google classroom to support students in their independent revision.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Revision of the list of topics.

Completion of past papers - past papers, mark schemes and video walkthroughs all on the GCSE Mathematics 2025 Google classroom. Also, these are available in electronic form on the website www.methodmaths.com. All Year 11 students have access to this website.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

We are currently working on our final topic for Component 1 - Television. Once we have completed this topic, we will move onto revision of all topics. Following the marking and moderation of the mocks, students will receive one-to-one feedback and guidance to further support their revision and lesson time will focus on revision of all Component 1 and 2 topics.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Regular revision of all topics, including rewatching set text episodes of Vigil and The Avengers (1965) - a suggested revision timetable will be shared shortly via Google Classroom.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

GCSE Physical Education (Edexcel)

An outline of the examination/s:

This practical assessment will be done through a practical assessment and moderator visit.

The Personal Exercise Plan will be finished in school by the end of March, then internally assessed and moderated.

Paper 1: 19th May Afternoon exam

Paper 2: 9th June Afternoon exam

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Once Paper 2 syllabus is finished in the next few weeks, students will work on their PEP until the end of March. From that time onwards, Paper 2 and Paper 1 will be revised. There will be a Mock for Paper 1 in March.

Practical lessons will cease after the Practical moderation.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Revision is the key to success. The best resource is the Edexcel Revision guide which pupils should have now. Past papers will also be sent home for students to practise exam questions.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Every fortnight, students are expected to revise for RE using guided material provided by the department during form times. There has been a list of students identified in which to provide specialist weekly revision sessions so that they are supported effectively in their revision. The department has also provided each student with a revision guide and access to key terms on Quizlet, which they should be revising and securing subject knowledge from. Finally, there are weekly revision materials being set on a Monday as part of the revision programme and this should not be classed as homework from the teacher.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Using the provided revision guides, and other virtual resources, students should be creating revision resources, answering practice questions and making sure that exam technique and subject knowledge is secure.

Additional support available:

Staff will share revision videos, example exam answers, useful links to YouTube / video clips, past papers and other resources to aid revision. There will be opportunities to meet with teachers for extra revision opportunities on the lead up to exams. Further information to follow.

GCSE Science: Combined Trilogy Science (AQA, 2 GCSEs)

An outline of the examination/s:

6 exams each of 1 hour and 15 mins - 2 in Biology, 2 in Chemistry and 2 in Physics - resulting in 2 full GCSE qualifications. Two tiers of entry - Higher and Foundation.

Have there been any Examination Board Modifications this year?

Yes - Students will receive a full formula sheet for their Physics exams only. This means they

will not have to learn each of the formulas by heart but must still be able to rearrange the equations as needed.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

The final units of work are currently being completed in lessons and students have been advised to focus their revision on the sections they feel least confident in. Checklists for each exam paper will be added to the Google Classrooms along with lots of revision material including revision mats for each topic and required practicals - required practicals will make up 25% of the final grade so are a priority for revision.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

We would advise every student to produce a revision timetable for themselves for all their exam subjects and to stick to the timetable.

Students should be revising every night in 20 minute blocks for a minimum of 1 hr per night for all subjects - use video links and the notes your teachers have shared with you on google classrooms to help but make sure your revision is ACTIVE - don't just read or watch - write summaries, make mind maps, flow charts etc.

GCSE Spanish (AQA)

An outline of the examination/s:

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

Students are currently reaching the end of the course. We will now be focussing on exam technique and exam timing. This period of time will include knowledge recall but students must be revising content at home.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Preparing general conversation questions for the speaking exam.

Practising with exemplar roleplay cards and photo cards for the speaking exam.

Revising vocabulary.

Practising past papers and exemplar questions for the listening, reading and writing exams.

Year 13 Examination Information

Year 13 students are working really hard to be successful in their exams, alongside finishing their NEAs and BTEC assignments. Students have access to revision resources on their Google Classrooms, as well as virtual platforms such as Seneca Learning and Isaac Physics. Revision sessions may become available later in the term. Students will be notified regarding availability. We advise that students develop a revision timetable, working backwards from their examination dates in order to ensure that they have covered everything in time for the exam. They should also use checklists to ensure that they have covered all aspects of each assessed topic. This should help them to identify gaps in their learning and compensate for these. All subjects have very well resources Google Classrooms and subject specialists are on hand to offer advice and guidance in college.

All students are recommended to be spending at least 4 hours per week per subject for their revision and independent study, with a big focus on good revision strategies. There will be a focus on examination preparation in PSHE from now until they finish. The *Power Hour* is a popular one, as this ensures that the students become familiar with exam style questions and time management. Completing school is a very short term goal now and it is worth every effort at this stage. The more that students can put in for the next few months can genuinely contribute to movement up though the grade boundaries. It's a long summer of relaxation after; all systems go.

Paper 1 includes material taken from the AS section of the course, and relevant practicals Paper 2 includes material taken from the A level section of the course, and relevant practicals Paper 3 includes any content and any practical skills, taken from the full two year course.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

The teaching of new subject matter will be completed in good time before the exams. Lesson time will then be dedicated to revision, examination technique training, and practising the writing of synoptic essays.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

A significant amount of time should be allocated to revision and study. This should include regularly reviewing the material taught, as well as ensuring that examination questions from the text, tests, and other study materials are mastered. Problems raised during study should be taken to staff promptly.

Additional support available:

Staff are readily available to answer questions and provide assistance throughout the school day and by email.

Student progress is closely monitored, and support is tailored to student needs as they arise.

A Level Business (Edexcel)

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

We are in the process of finishing the teaching component of the course, and will then go into an intensive period of exam practice. Students should ensure that they master every exam question they come across, both in class tests and in their texts.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

A significant amount of time should be spent in study and revision, both during the week and at weekends. They should be actively involved in making sure that they both understand what has been taught, and can apply that knowledge effectively in answering exam questions. They should also be making effective use of the extensive support provided by the college.

Additional support available:

Supervised revision has been made available throughout the week, both formal and informal. There are usually two to three lessons available each day for students to "sit in". Students are actively encouraged to contact their teacher by email should they come across problems with their studies outside of school hours to ensure that support is promptly and efficiently given.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

NEA folders will be finalised and submitted. A full mock will be undertaken in March.

We will finish teaching the final aspects of the course, then undertake guided revision, complete past papers and do timed essay work.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Students need to revisit all of the topics we have taught over the two years, using class notes, the student booklets they have been given for each topic and revision information (including teacher's powerpoints) on the Google classroom.

For each topic, they need to revise key theorists, concepts and issues, and decide on their opinion(s) surrounding the topics. They also need to revise all of the key language frameworks, especially grammar and syntax.

Additional support available:

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

For Ms Brinton's side of the course (Paper1), we start our revision of *Hamlet* after the February half term break. We will revise the text as well as the skills and knowledge needed for the exam. We will also practise essay/exam skills. We will then return to revision on our Section 2 texts. The mock in March will be a full paper 1.

For Ms Swift's side of the course (Paper 2), we will start our revision by focusing on section A and the unseen extracts, making links into the Gothic timeline. Will then look at Section B to consolidate student understanding and evaluation of contextual influences on set texts. The mock in March will be a full paper 2.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

Final C/W submissions are due after the half term break so these should be pretty much completed by now to allow students to focus fully on the examinations.

For Ms Brinton's side of the course:

Revise Hamlet thoroughly.

 Choose extracts to practise for question 2a (focusing on Shakespeare's use of language, form, structure and dramatic effects).

- Re-read Hamlet and watch some different productions online.
- Revise textual quotations from the whole play and critical responses.
- Set yourself some challenging theories about characters, themes, relationships etc. and practise writing a 'thesis' response and working out a 3 point line of argument, and supportive references to critical readings and productions.

Re-read The Merchant's Tale and She Stoops to Conquer

- Consider comparisons and contrasts between the two texts.
- Revise textual quotations, and critical responses to both texts, and their contexts.
- Use previous questions to practise writing a 'thesis' response and working out a 3 point line of argument, with references to textual evidence, context, critical readings (and productions of SSTC).
- For both, practise planning and writing against the clock.

For Ms Swift's side of the course (Paper 2):

- Revise Gothic timeline/seminal texts/authors/dates and how they used the Gothic genre to articulate cultural anxieties from each era. *refer to the worksheet. Focus on use of language, form, structure
- Re-read Frankenstein/Dorian Gray key extracts and make contextual links to wider concepts - revise use of literary allusions and intertextuality within the novel. Be able to use key critics and interpretations of this novel *stage play/film productions
- Re-read The Bloody Chamber key stories that allow comparison make contextual links to wider concepts - revise use of literary allusions and intertextuality within the novel.
 Be able to use key critics and interpretations of this collection - film productions
- For both the Unseen Gothic extract and Frankenstein + TBC practice planning and writing against the clock.

Additional support available:

We have sufficient class time to provide suitable revision and exam practice. Should students require support on specific topics they should seek further guidance from their teacher. Further revision opportunities will be provided.

The examination may include short open, open response and resource-linked questions. The examination includes 12-mark and 20-mark extended writing questions. Calculators may be used.

Paper 3 - Written examination: 2 hours and 15 minutes 20% of the qualification 70 marks

An externally-assessed written examination. A resource booklet will contain information about

the geographical issue. All questions in the examination draw synoptically on knowledge and understanding from compulsory content drawn from different parts of the course. The examination may include short open, open response and resource-linked questions. The examination includes 8-mark, 18-mark and 24-mark extended writing questions. Calculators may be used.

Have there been any Examination Board Modifications this year?

There are no plans to modify or provide advanced information for the upcoming Physics examinations. In addition to this, the support with the practical endorsement has been removed and students will now need to demonstrate competencies across all skills and all apparatus and techniques over a minimum of 12 required practicals.

How will we continue to prepare for the examinations in coming weeks?

We will finish the course by May 6th and will spend the remainder of the time revising.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

They should be aiming to spend an hour at home as a minimum for every hour that we spend in class. This would be 9 hours over the 2 weeks as a minimum.

Students should be making notes at home from the relevant page in the revision guide and completing the page of exam style questions from the exam workbook they have.

They should make sure that their Isaac Physics assignments are complete to 75%

Students should also make sure that they are writing up completed tasks in their home learning log. I will be checking this regularly and it is a very effective way of identifying issues that need to be discussed.

Additionally, students should be completing exam questions from the physics and math tutor website as well as any other questions that they can find in the textbooks that are on the google classroom.

How should your child be preparing for the examinations?

For each hour completed in the lesson, students should be aiming to complete an hour of independent study. This could include annotating class notes, practicing exam style questions, watching instructional video clips or reading around the subject.

Students need to pay particular attention to evaluating studies and theories and applying their knowledge to the stem of a question. Essay writing under timed conditions will also be extremely beneficial.

Using past exam papers alongside the mark schemes is excellent practice and will allow students to understand how to access the higher marks.


